Fanfare had one more parting surprise The Big Band sound. It was the perfect end to a good day.



There follows an important notice courtesy of Arthur. Having had the tests described below, as my mother died from an undetected AAA, please don't dismiss this as it might well affect you! (Ed)

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA) (A silent killer)

Gentlemen. Many of you will have heard of this medical condition but for those that have not I provide some details below

An abdominal aortic aneurysm is an enlarged area in the lower part of the major vessel that supplies blood to the body (aorta). The aorta is the largest blood vessel in the body, so a ruptured abdominal aortic aneurysm is likely to cause life-threatening bleeding with a very high fatality rate.

The problem with this condition is that you have no way of knowing that you have it until it bursts!

About 5 or 6 years ago a screening programme was put into place inviting men attaining 65 years to have a simple ultra sound to check their condition**. Unfortunately the programme did not back date to those who had already reached 65 so anyone over 70 will probably not have had an invite

Not a problem as you can telephone your local GP/hospital/health authority who will advise how you can make an appointment.

If you have not had an invitation or had one but ignored it I highly recommend that you do so.

It's quick, painless and - important to us pensioners - FREE!

You are told immediately of your diagnosis and depending on the result you will either never need another scan, be asked to return for a further scan at a later date or, in very rare cases, referred to a consultant

I had a check a few weeks ago and pleased to report no problem although there was some debate by the medical staff that I might be 5 months pregnant.


