

# Merrettable Times



Last month it was the AGM and now the first ordinary meeting of the year is over, albeit on Zoom. The business started by focusing on the splendid work the Poulner Pod has been doing in establishing a fitting memorial to Jimmie Gordon by means of a bench to be sited next to his usual bus stop.

The Pod informed the meeting that the cost of the proposed bench and commemorative plaque falling on the Club would be around £600. There would be further costs for creation of the base and its siting but there were other contributions from Table and Jimmie's family. The meeting considered and discussed ways of funding the majority of the Club costs but after considering an option to use reserves, it was agreed that Club members, on a wholly voluntary basis, would each donate £10 to hopefully raise the £600.

The three Club speakers later in the evening, John Clough, David Okey and Bill Field told us about unknown aspects of their lives. Firstly, John Clough got us to believe in the magic of the Bermuda Triangle via a story about flying to Jersey in an airborne transit van, otherwise known as an Aurigny Trislander. Stormy weather in Jersey, a fire in the plane taking the Cloughs to Florida resulting in the Bermuda landing means just one thing - never get on the same plane as John Clough and family.

David Okey, an alumnus of Mrs Evans' Educational Emporium, started his love of the water and sailing at an early age. When most 11 yr olds were getting bikes for passing the 11+, David got a dinghy. From working with power boats, helping to set the World diesel engine powerboat record, travelling all over here and abroad, taking a commission in the Royal Navy, joining Table and working for one of those Government agencies no one talks about, David has led a far from boring life.

Lastly, Bill Field took us back to an age, nearly 60 years ago in fact, when he and others in Ringwood RT organised what later became part of Table lore, for all the wrong reasons. The infamous Table event at a local hotel, started innocently enough but as often as Table events did, especially when involving alcohol and a 'male entertainer', news hit the Sunday tabloids. Bill's attempts to avoid the press went down in history with his parting words that "this was a normal Round Table night" and made the News of the World.

I attended the 75<sup>th</sup> National AGM on Zoom on the 24 April. As our voting delegate I had to sit through the 5 hour meeting and voted in hopefully the right way. The National President and most of Council are continuing this year but there were two posts where votes were needed. The first was the election of the Vice President which was won by Jim Conway who is a member of three 41 Clubs: Smethwick, Old Bored Executives and London Old Tablers. The second post was for the National Councillors' Liaison Officer and Graham Sloan of Dragons 41 (wherever that is) and three other 41 Clubs was elected.

There were a number of contentious resolutions which resulted in a little chaos, but National Conference wouldn't be the same without some degree of confusion.

There was a proposal which tried to clarify what exactly was meant by the term 'Canvassing', which members may recall was an issue at the Torbay Conference in 2019 when a National Presidential candidate was asked to stand down at the last moment for allegedly carrying out this heinous crime. 'Canvassing' was accused of being a Humpty Dumpty word, as National could say it meant whatever they thought it should, which could change to suit the circumstances.

The Clubs that proposed and seconded the 'Canvassing' resolution made a good case for its demise and National, which originally opposed the motion, realised at the last minute that they had better do something and produced an amendment which was on the screen for all of 10 seconds, so I'm not really sure what it said. Changes to national rules require a two thirds majority for them to be passed and that's when the real fun started. The National amendment didn't reach the  $\frac{2}{3}$  majority and at least one delegate was very concerned that 'they' were trying to count parts of a person. He obviously wasn't paying attention during his school maths classes when they covered percentages, especially as he kept repeating his claim. This he did again as the original motion, which became the substantive motion, also lost by not achieving  $\frac{2}{3}$  majority by a narrow margin. A further complication was that a number of voting delegates were proxys for more than one Club and some of those additional votes seemed to have gone missing. Donald Trump would have been right at home. National wanted a recount, then a new vote was floated but some sanity returned and after ensuring that all the proxy votes had been counted, it still failed to reach the required  $\frac{2}{3}$ . So back to square one and it only took an hour!

One motion that did pass was the removal of the proxy vote mechanism when voting for National Officers. This means that if you want the Club to vote for a particular candidate, someone will have to be physically present at the AGM, wherever that may be.

The real problem with doing this AGM through Zoom was that there was little fun and no real jokes. There was a joke which had something to do with Psalm 129 but by then I had lost the will to live and it was my turn not to be paying attention.

Very last thing. Ladies Night is basically sold out so thanks to everyone for the support. Look out for other pieces in the 'Times' which will update us.

So that's all 'till next time.



*This photo was taken in Nambung National Park, 3 hours drive north of Perth, Western Australia. The rock formation - known as The Pinnacles - is unique and formed within the last 80,000 years. Limestone-rich sand blown from the seashore interacts with decaying vegetation plus acid rainwater to form hard limestone on top of existing soft limestone which gradually dissolves away, leaving the formation. It was interesting to see a unique natural environment of rocks, as western USA has, but without any Hollywood cowboys!*

## THE VERITABLE MERRETTABLE DIBBER

I wrote last year that "You can't cheat nature" and boy has this April proved that old gardening adage very true. Neither can you rush nature, as anyone who has tried to, this cold and windy Spring has discovered, and possibly paid a high price. The north and easterly winds have been very harsh, and, combined with the frequent very low overnight temperatures, made germination difficult and any growth extremely slow. All in all so far it has been a tricky growing season – let's hope for better, and warmer conditions.

Meanwhile if you put your onion sets in when I advised, they should be developing nicely, ditto potatoes if you chitted and then planted them early in bags or pots. Don't rush to sow anything at the moment, unless you can bring them on in protected conditions. Salad crops, beetroot and carrots won't hurt for not hitting the dirt for another week or so, as temperatures don't look set to be that good until well into May.

So for now just a few thoughts and comments mostly gleaned from this week's Gardeners Question Time (GW) and Gardener's World (GW) :-

Making compost is best done with a wider and lower heap if possible. If not and using a 'dalek' style bin, give a lot of thought to its position. If in a generally sunny position the plastic mould will be thin enough to allow the contents to easily overheat, killing micro-organisms and above all, worms, both of which are essential to making good quality compost. Too sunny may not be best.

I mentioned chitting potatoes and whether to or not. You can plant spuds without developed chits, but they will be slower to develop, so if you want first earlies as early as possible, always chit them. But where GQT taught me something new is that more chits on a tuber leads to more but smaller potatoes. Less chits means bigger but fewer spuds per plant. Longer chits are weaker, the ideal is just under an inch, if an egg sized tuber develops chits at both ends, cut it in half and plant both bits, chits upwards of course!!

Much talk on hydrangeas (and other shrubs and bushes) suffering leaf curl and brown frost burns from air frosts. Plant cells are easily damaged by frequent temperature changes, mature ones will get some protection from their barked stems, use fleece to create pockets of warmer air.

Finally on GW on Friday 31<sup>st</sup> Monty Don planted a neat Mediterranean herb bowl, well worth a look. He promises more on herbs in a few weeks thyme (time, geddit?!!!)

Keeeeeeeeeeep digging!!.

## JIMMIE GORDON



Jimmie was born on 12th June near Glasgow in 1920 and he died on 21st December 2020 aged 100. He was in the army stationed near Ringwood when he met his wife Elsie who worked in the Ringwood Post Office. They married and had two boys called Paul and Neil and he lived all his life after the army in Ringwood and latterly in the house in Northfield Road.

He started his Round Table life with the New Milton table and then in 1959 he started Ringwood Round Table with 30 members.

At the inaugural meeting 210 men wanted to attend but they could only get 139 into the room. The first fund raising event Ringwood Round Table ran was a jumble sale in order to raise money to buy a donkey called Mary which they donated to the Sheiling School. Sadly Mary died so they raised more money and bought another donkey called June!

In 1964 Jimmie started to help raise money in the Empire Cancer Research Campaign which is now called Cancer Research. He collected all his life and with the help of others he raised over £250,000.

Because of all his efforts, Cancer Research awarded him with the 'Flame of Hope Award' at a special lunch in London. Jimmie and Elsie were also invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace.

Also in 1964 he formed Ringwood ex-Tablers and in 2009 was made an honorary member of our club. (see the photo above). Sadly Elsie died in 2016 and Jimmie's eyesight started to deteriorate. He was virtually blind when he died.

However every couple of days he walked down the centre of Northfield Road waving his white stick where he met all his mates who were also catching the bus into Ringwood. He was well known to all the local shops and businesses.

He lived in a sheltered accommodation flat for about a year but because he could no longer look after himself his son Neil moved him to the Oak Mount Care Home.

On his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday a small group of ex-Tablers stood in the garden at the care home whilst John Adams played his pipes. Jimmie loved it.

Sadly on the 21<sup>st</sup> December 2020, aged 100, he died in Bournemouth hospital. He was a remarkable man who always wore a collar and tie, even when gardening, and he always had a smile on his face.

If it was not for Jimmie Gordon, Ringwood Round Table and Ringwood ex-Table in Ringwood may not have existed.

*The above was written and presented by Graham Hoyle at a recent meeting but is well worth a second read and links in well with the Club's plans to commemorate Jimmie with an annual award that will be presented at Round Table each year. Ex Table will also be funding a commemorative bench that will be positioned by his favourite bus stop in Poulner. The Poulner Pod have worked tremendously hard to research this project and made a Zoom presentation at the April club meeting.*
