

Dear Sir,

I am writing to thank you for bouncing my cheque with which I endeavoured to pay my plumber last month. By my calculations, three nanoseconds must have elapsed between his presenting the cheque and the arrival in my account of the funds needed to honour it. I refer, of course, to the automatic monthly deposit of my Pension, an arrangement, which, I admit, has been in place for only thirty eight years. You are to be commended for seizing that brief window of opportunity, and also for debiting my account £30 by way of penalty for the inconvenience caused to your bank. My thankfulness springs from the manner in which this incident has caused me to rethink my errant financial ways. I noticed that whereas I personally attend to your telephone calls and letters, but when I try to contact you, I am confronted by the impersonal, overcharging, pre-recorded, faceless entity which your bank has become. From now on, I, like you, choose only to deal with a flesh-and-blood person. My mortgage and loan payments will therefore and hereafter no longer be automatic, but will arrive at your bank by cheque, addressed personally and confidentially to an employee at your bank whom you must nominate. Be aware that it is an offence under the Postal Act for any other person to open such an envelope. Please find attached an Application Contact Status which I require your chosen employee to complete. I am sorry it runs to eight pages, but in order that I know as much about him or her as your bank knows about me, there is no alternative. Life in Round Table Wokingham 831 – Paul Thackray

I discovered Round Table in 1969 when we moved to Wokingham. We knew no one in the town but a neighbour Ian Siffre invited me to a meeting of the recently formed RT 831 which had spun out of the neighbouring Bracknell table. It had a full membership at the time and a waiting list of potential members due to the rapidly growing commuter population of the town.

Membership ranged across the whole range of professions and comprised locals, commuters and international travellers. I was lucky and jumped the queue as the only member of the profession of Chartered Secretary to apply. We were a very active table meeting fortnightly in the Bush Hotel in the town centre.

Occasionally we had a guest speaker but usually we were entertained by a member giving a talk about his job many of which were worthy of a stand up comedy act. Ladies Circle was very active and in the summer months they organised progressive suppers when we moved between selected members homes each hosting one course of a meal. For this we paid 10 shillings (50p) a head to participate. They were a great way to get to know our spouses.

The highlight of the year was the town carnival which we organised with some thirty or so floats parading through the town, followed by a fair with many trade stalls and amusements on the Jubilee fields (now built on) just out of the town centre. It was always a great success and raised several thousand pound for charity as I can testify from my years as treasurer and later auditor.

We were a table of many talents and each year put on a music hall comedy show for

the entertainment of members. We were fortunate in having some very talented script writers. They could get a bit smutty, but would be regarded as tame by today's standards.

Area were very active and we competed in best comedy act competitions and debating competitions in both of which we were winners. We didn't do so well in 7 a side soccer, 7 a side hockey or a rowing race on the Thames when our boat almost sank.

A number of joint events were held with other tables of which there were several in the surrounding area. The table was active in the local community with regular visits to the local disabled children's hospital as volunteer helpers, organising the annual bonfire for Barnardos and taking pensioners Christmas shopping.

Another innovation was a visit to the Weize beer festival in Belgium. While it would be nice to say we had happy memories of the visit, most of us could not remember very much except that we drank a lot of beer.

Our member waiting list grew to such an extent that we had sufficient applicants to form a new table and so West Forest Table was born with thirty members at the outset.

In line with the general decline in Table membership the two tables have now amalgamated to become Wokingham and West Forest Round Table.

Long may they flourish and carry on the legacy of fellowship.



Minutes of previous meeting

The minutes of the meeting on 4 August 2020 were taken as read.

Matters arising

Jeff didn't have much to add to the proposed NFDC boundary changes.

Correspondence

A letter from Julia's House reminding us that we are highly valued for our support, and outlining the crucial work they are able to do in helping extremely vulnerable children thanks to the donations they receive, albeit that this has become more difficult over the Covid period.

Chairman's comments

Richard talked about Remembrance Day (Sunday, 8 November). John Harper had confirmed that there would not be a service this year nor a gathering of wreath laying, but that this could be done privately. JH is arranging a 41 Club wreath (cost circa £20). RC would like a few to attend together with perhaps John Adams and his bagpipes.

Xmas Cards – Part of the money raised last year has been kept in abeyance awaiting a need following Covid-19; One proposal is Ringwood Day Care Centre; Gordon is content for others to make suggestions.

Council agreed to run the card again at the same minimum donation level as last year (£15 per couple and £7.50 for a single, but more if members want); Mike Callaghan is happy to prepare and distribute. Richard C to sanitise the distribution list in conjunction with Caroline. Club members to be invited to submit Xmas photos for the front of the card.

Next Year – Richard Carter's view is that he will hand over to Bob as normal allowing Bob the time to get on and organise his council. National (per Richard D) are going on for 2 years.

500 + *500 Walk* – Richard and Susie have both reached the 300-mile point; they are planning on 520 as that gets them to Aviemore! £100 raised to date – there is still time to make it more. The chairman will need a little help if he is to surpass Captain Tom's achievements (*secretary's observation!*).

Vice Chairman

Still planning to go ahead with Ladies Night but this will be kept under close review as (Covid) events unfold.

Secretary

Chris is taking names for teams of 4 for the Christchurch Boule evening on 7 October although this will need to be kept under review depending on how Government restrictions develop (**post meeting:** this looks now extremely unlikely). Nothing to report.



And Now, The End Is Near

Now it is not really light now until 0645, and dark soon after 1930, a loss of about 5 hours growing light compared to the longer summer days. With cooler night temperatures it makes a big difference to what we can harvest over the next few weeks. The lowest night temperature here last night was 7.7C, that was inside the greenhouse. No sensitive plants will grow in those temperatures and it is likely to be below 6C tonight. So time to take drastic action if we are to get any more harvested from our summer crops.

All Year Round lettuce

These can grow to a useable size in only a month but unless already well under way any late sowing is now going to struggle. Cut losses by using young leaves now and making sure you cut plants young too. Another 2 weeks and lettuce is done for.

Runner Beans

To be honest mine ended up as a bit of a disappointment. Loads of flowers I expected to be giving them away by the bag load, but it hasn't happened. Fed and watered them, think my canes were a bit too close together, plus the very hot spell in July caused a lot of the bees to take a holiday, and the flowers dropped without setting. Cut mine down two weeks ago but if yours are still up unless keeping them going for seed (ready when the pods have turned light brown but make sure they are dry) then take any beans of a reasonable size now, as they will not grow much longer. If you are trying for more fruiting pods then remove as many leaves as you can so the plants focus on pod production.

Climbing French Beans

A late triumph more on this in next year's issues, but they have so much going for them I'll grow these next year instead of runner beans. If you did try any, give them the same treatment now as for runners. I have just taken down two wigwams that did well from seed planted only on June 24th and still have one lot up planted July 7th.

Courgettes

Carried on their merry way, we have never had less than 6 fruits in the fridge, and despite my biggest mistake this year of cutting a stem on my 4th plant instead of the fruit I was aiming at, and thus losing my (at that time) most productive plant. I have therefore learned that three plants are more than enough. However I forgot that often they produce more than one fruiting stem, and my other three are actually 6 fruiting plants between them. Next year maybe two will do, Defender variety brilliant cropper. They are very temperature sensitive, there are 10 fruits on them now but will be lucky to get more than 5 normal sized fruits this coming weekend. Again take all leaves off between the root and the first fruit on the stem. In this week's Gardener's World Monty Don was growing squashes on a vertical frame, might try that next year as they take up an enormous amount of room.

Tomatoes

Also very sensitive though my 6 outdoor plants are giving the best crop I have ever managed. Greenhouse all but finished, again take of all the leaves to within about 6" of the by now pinched out growing tip. Take off all and any fruit that has started colouring, certainly when they are 50% plus ripeness and bring them inside to finish off on a warm window sill. Not much you can do with the green ones you're left with, maybe make chutney? I heard Clay Jones on Gardeners Question Time Sunday 2pm about 55 years ago saying you could have green tomatoes fried. Never tried it, maybe this year is the one I can persuade the Lady Dibber to try some for me!!

Ian the charity plants you sold me were all Alicante, and I owe you a big thank you which I'll explain separately to you. But no letter to the Cartier Chronicles editor, or the local trading standards office!!

Raspberries

Again take off all fruit that looks like ripening and sacrifice the rest, they won't turn in these temperatures. Leave any strong canes that did not fruit this year, (Ian the three Autumn fruiting ones you kindly you sold me but we thought would not fruit until next year have done brilliantly) all those that did fruit this year cut the cane back to at least an inch of the ground and, if there are no tiny shoots showing at the base, right down to ground level.

Butternut squashes

Not too temperature sensitive in the fruits but the plant itself is. Soon as they are a nice fawn colour remove the fruits, they store brilliantly anyway. Keeeeeeeeep digging!!

Richard and Susie had continued with their 500+500 walk challenge and Richard sent an update to members on 27th September:

First of all, our thanks for your generous contributions to the fundraising for Dementia UK.

The update on our progress is that we have now reached 400miles each so we feel as if we are on the last leg (literally!) We've managed to walk every day from 22nd July when we started (I can hear you saying we should get out more) and had hoped to reach the 400 milestone whilst on holiday for a week in Northumberland. Unfortunately, that had to be cancelled because of local lockdowns so a New Forest walk benefited from that experience.

We have walked together much but not all of the time and kept in step (I must stop doing this) in terms of miles We therefore expect to complete the challenge next month.

As a result, the green colour fades and the yellow carotenes that we can't usually see become visible.

A super place to see the pigs and the changing leaves is the Lyndhurst Road between Burley and the A35. Fun Fact 2: The best autumn colours occur when temperatures remain above freezing, and when the weather is dry, bright and sunny. Lets hope the sun returns! Happy leaf peeping! YICF Caroline





Round Tabling with Steve Mursell

My introduction into Round Tabling came early in 1979 when as a newly appointed manager with Nationwide Building Society I was introduced into Cullompton Round Table by my manager. Being in rural Devon it sounded like everyone spoke a foreign language but the main focus was to support a recently started charity, The Anthony Nolan Trust. All fundraising was directed to that charity with the highlight being a sponsored camel push from Exeter

One year later we moved down the road to Brixham Round Table which was old fashioned tabling at its best! There were many highlights with the aim being to extract the maximum amount of cash from tourists for local charities. With two theatres in Torbay there was an annual charity cricket match with the stars of the shows, such as Russ



Abbott, Roger de Courcey and bear, Bella Emberg, Bobby Crush etc. A laid back event where a Tabler who was headteacher at the Secondary School opened up his school field, the ladies supported us by selling ice creams, tea and cakes and spectators paid an entrance fee. A great fundraiser for no real effort. So laid back that one year the treasurer almost left the takings behind on the cricket pitch after we all shared a few beers on the cricket pitch. Other highlights were our annual charity auction where we collected people's tat in a van and sold it off at a public auction with all profits going to local charities. In hindsight a lot of hard work going out every evening moving wardrobes down three flights of stairs; doing the householder a favour by getting rid of it; but we did raise some useful monēy!

about 15 members and helpers! We ran it for a number of years until we had an exceptionally wet weekend and cancelled the event with no pluvius insurance. We resourcefully covered our debts with helpful "donations" from local businesses but didn't take the risk again.

My job then took me to Waterlooville where I teamed up with Mike Edwards at Nationwide and I had two years in the club where the emphasis was on community service and having fun. One highlight was an auction of promises providing Tablers as unpaid labour for a day for the lucky winners. I distinctly remember together with another Tabler going over to West Sussex to clear a garden of trees that had been blown over in the hurricane.

I then moved over to Chandlers Ford to meet up again with one Mike Edwards joining Eastleigh and Chandlers Ford Round Table. The big highlight was our annual beer festival jointly organised with Camra, a big money spinner and although hard work with the long hours was great fun. The principle was simple, Camra looked after the beer and made sure that it was well stocked and together with Ladies Circle we took care of the "catering", in the loosest sense before the days of food hygiene etc etc.

All we had to do was make sure there was copious supplies of vegetable and meat samosas, ham rolls and cheese rolls. Brilliant fun with everyone getting happier as the day went on and hungrier to soak up the beer.

And of course there was Carnival, notable entries include the Monty Pythons knights sketch and dressed up in model Spitfires. (see picture right)







THE PEDAL TO THE FLOOR

The occasional missive from your Club Motoring Correspondent. So Lights Out and Go! Hello enthusiasts, fans of this column and others!

Well, you ask, what's the old duffer going to ramble on about this time? Up to now it all been technical, this time it's something different – it's about the future. Whilst most of us will be considered to be older than average that hopefully does not mean we have to give up driving and motoring.

So to look into the future let's briefly look at the incredible technological changes in the recent past and their application to motoring.

Yes, there have been significant changes in the use of new materials, or the application of materials. A lot has been driven by the green agenda and a lot simply by the aim of making all vehicles much more fuel efficient. The most far reaching advances have been in electrical and electronic systems.

Vehicles now have to be designed with end of life recycling in mind. They are more aerodynamically efficient and have now all have high tech electronic and engine management systems to optimise performance and fuel economy. They are also much safer to be in with designed in crumple zones, air bags and other key components collapsible in a serious impact.

It's the electrical and electronic systems that are going to have the greatest impact in the immediate future – they already have. Whilst driverless cars are still in the experimental stage there is a strong lobby to bring their legal use forward – so watch that space.

In the meantime we have lane monitoring radar and active interference in driver control, we have radar monitored cruise control systems that will take over and automatically apply the brakes if the system consider the car is too close to another object. Most new cars are now equipped as standard with LED lights, a lot with parking rear view cameras, some with as many cameras as are needed to park the car at the press of a button without the driver doing anything.

We also have the mixed propulsion systems – traditional fuel petrol or diesel, hybrid being part electric and part traditional fuel – some are rechargeable hybrid, some self charging hybrid, and then there are the fully electric vehicles.

I thought it might be helpful to any of us when we have to consider replacing a car to help understand some of the jargon and what it all really means now and over the next few years, and end by giving my view slightly further into the future.

• Petrol power – still available – manufacturers leaning towards smaller turbo charged engines with sophisticated engine management systems to maintain sufficient power but with better fuel economy, and lower exhaust emissions.

• Diesel power – still available – improved engine management systems and improved exhaust systems to improve fuel economy and improve emissions.

• Hybrid – these do need some explanation – there are plug in or rechargeable hybrid and self charging hybrid, and then within that category some are classed as mild hybrid! Rechargeable mean they have to be periodically plugged into a suitable external electric charging point. Self charging harvest waste energy when slowing down and under braking. They then can either be managed to drive as an electric vehicle if so set up to do so, or the electric power will be automatically used along with the conventional fueled power at the discretion of the engine management system. (Mrs. F now has a mild hybrid.)

• Then there are fully electric – these have to be recharged regularly – the equivalent of a fuel refill. Faster charging points and in larger numbers are being introduced as these types of vehicles have become more popular.

Most large manufacturers are offering all of the above. There are those, notably Tesla, as a new entrant, that only offer fully electric.

The grand intention is to save the planet, and the by product is to save you money, although governments are having to manage motoring taxes as trends change.

So how is this going to affect you? Well if you are looking to change your car you will be faced with the choices outlined above. You will have to decide on what is best for you. Do you only ever do short journeys? All electric might then suit. Do you often travel to remote areas? In which case conventional or self charging hybrid might be more suitable. Are you only interested in high performance? Then you may consider conventional fuel only.

You may also need to consider the resale value of the car in the future. Is the technology you buy today going to hold up in value as new technologies are introduced? Should you play safe – like your correspondent – and keep a high performance modern classic?

Only you can decide what is best for you, but I hope this has helped lift the veil on some of the jargon. So where is it going to go next? My view is that what I have outlined above is where we will be over the next few – say up to 5 years.

After that I expect to see an increasing number of fuel cell cars coming to the market. They are already here but currently in low numbers. Fuel cell technology is the conversion of hydrogen and oxygen into electrical energy through an electrochemical reaction. Water is the by product. The key will be producing, storing and distributing hydrogen safely at low cost. The indications are already that this will be achievable, and a number of companies are already investing large sums into the technology. Most large manufacturers already have experimental vehicles running. Toyota amongst others can already sell you a 2nd generation one.

Happy motoring. (Some of the all electric are incredibly quick!)

Tabling in Holywood 841 and Area 11



I first heard about Round Table in "El Chippo" in Arenal, Majorca, in 1972. We were on a 5 day Autumn break and on arrival at the hotel, met two bankers from the Northern Bank Development Corporation in Belfast. After a last night on sangria we all went for a late meal where they invited me to a Fellowship Meeting at Holywood RT, a few days after our return. The Speaker that night was the Consultant in maxillofacial surgery, who had removed my wisdom teeth 10 years earlier.

He showed colour slides of the bullet wound to the face of John Taylor MP, and the facial reconstruction as he was carrying it out. With the effects of the heat and smoke in the room, and of course the colour photographs, the 'natural break' revealed a number sitting on the stairs feeling unwell and blood on the floor of the Gents where a prospective member had passed out. Fortunately one of the Tablers was a GP. I was the only new member recruited that night!



Holywood is a large village on the shores of Belfast Lough and 3 miles from where we lived, and the local Round Table had a great history of fund raising for charity. It had provided the first "quick response vehicle", a Morris Minor Van and defibrillator, in NI, three years earlier. A couple of years after I joined, the Heart Consultant returned to give a further talk on the subject and reminded Tablers that he had forecast 5 heart attacks in the Table over a 5 year period. It turned out the chap I was sitting beside had had 3 occasions to use the "quick response" defibrillator and subsequently had one of the first transplants in NI. He lived for another 20 years.

Every Christmas we helped the elderly and needy in the area. Yes, about our age now! First through sponsored coal deliveries and then by collecting food outside local supermarkets and making up Christmas hampers. I remember just how much these, and our visits, meant to the old folk each year who may have seen but a few people in between.

We also provided personal alarms for people living alone in a Warden supervised community, which at the time was a great innovation.

One of our Tablers was a master at a local Grammar School and for many years we were able to use the school coach to bring very excited children from the local Dr Barnardo's to the school swimming pool each week.

Fund raising was always fun, and as well as the usual Barn Dances, Beetle Drives, Safari Suppers, Fairs with model aeroplane displays, we organised Race Nights. The first one in 1975 raised £2500, but 4 years later only managed £1200. We suspected we were being ripped off by a few people but could not prove it. Incidentally around that time I visited 2 Tables which were also going to run Race Nights. Greenwich RT, a fairly large outgoing Table, thought they could raise £1000, and a few weeks later I visited Lucan, a small village outside Dublin with just 12 Tablers, and they were setting a target of £5000. And they say size matters!

Area 11 was great for social functions and events, with annual family weekend rallies being one of the highlights of the year. On one such occasion a complete train from Dublin to Waterford was booked, with rally registration completed on the train. There was always a Formal Night and a Fancy Dress night with a competition. That year the theme was 'shipwrecked'. Holywood came second but the worthy winner was City of Derry Table who went as 'space ship wrecked', dressed up in foil 'space suits' with their Chairman, who had lost his arm in an accident, carrying his artificial one covered in foil.

Area competitions included Jokers Wild nights for best stand up comedian, (adult female entertainment sometimes occurred afterwards, when the RT night had officially been closed). This was of course the Seventies and also happened occasionally after Holywood's Christmas Dinner but 30 miles from Holywood!

An annual rowing boat race was held in a bay in Belfast Lough. This was officially known as the Punt and Rowlocks Race but was normally called something else.

There was no risk assessment and life jackets were unavailable for what was really dodgems on water. Holywood RT enjoyed visiting and hosting other Tables and when repaying a great visit to Carlisle we wanted to provide our guests with Northern Irish hospitality.

After the meeting a group came home for a 'night cap' where someone produced poteen. The Chairman of Carlisle was 6ft 4ins and built like a tank. That night he failed to live up to his name of 'The Mighty Quinn'.

On another visit, we went to Stewarton near Glasgow. Pat and I were hosted by a great couple who were providing one of the main courses for a safari supper. Our host, Sylvia had prepared a whole salmon which was cooling in the kitchen as we arrived. Unfortunately the neighbour's cat got through the window and demolished the lot. Not to be outdone she managed to obtain another salmon and get it ready in time for the other guests to arrive.

One memorable Area visit was to a Burns Night Supper in Girvan. On this occasion we stayed in the hotel which was the venue for the function. Although we were there by invitation, our hosts



were not particularly welcoming. The Burns 'ritual' was very well done, but the after dinner speaker was a member of the SNP and his talk was very political. At the 'natural break', the Chairman of Belfast RT filled a prophylactic with water in the Gents, put it on a salver and all 16 Area 11 Tablers solemnly filed into the function and addressed the 'Irish Haggis'. This went down like a lead balloon with the Scots. During my year as chairman, Pat and I attended 20 of the 22 Table Ladies Nights throughout the Area, often being hosted because of the distance. Holywood's was the last one on the circuit and it was tra-



ditional for the Chairman to throw a party in his home after the Dance, with guests leaving before breakfast. That year a couple of Chairmen raided Pat's wardrobe and appeared dressed in her clothes. She was not amused!

International Year of the Child occurred during my year and we held a Charity Concert with Clubsound, a big Irish Showband in the 1970's and 80's. The proceeds were presented to the NSPCC and we received widespread publicity for it on the radio and in the press. Further funds were raised that year to provide a Billiards Table for the local Salvation Army Eventide Home. Happy but hazy memories include the Golden Jubilee Regional dinner in 1977, (the year the Louis Marchesi Lifeboat was launched). In addition to wine on the table someone had managed to get Bushmills Distillery to provide a bottle of Black Bush between every 4 and a

great night was had by all. The 1978 National Conference in Glasgow was not for the faint hearted. Holywood went stag and after 4 days and three nights I can see why we had to leave Table at 40! 6000 attended that year in the Kelvin Hall, only beaten by 10,000 the following year in the NEC Birmingham.

In the mid 90's with numbers down to 10 Tablers for a while, Holywood RT embarked on a plan to take 60 terminally ill children and their carers to see Santa in Lapland. After raising terrific sponsorship, they still needed to find over £10000 to pay the much discounted residual cost of the flight to British Midland. They managed to raise this with some help from the Holywood RT 'family' and even managed to repeat the event the following year. This shows what a small group with drive and vision can achieve. Unfortunately like many Tables Holywood closed in the mid 2000's. When we were moving to England in 1998 I selected a Surveyor and Solicitor from a panel of 6 given to me by NatWest Ringwood - John Humphreys and Ian Fretten, both Christchurch 41 Club, but I was

He was Membership Officer and subsequently invited me along and the rest as they say is history. Tabling has been a large part of my adult life and many of the people I have met along the way are still friends to this day.

Another great article from our 'imported' Tablers. Thank you Derrick. Next month another treat.....Mr Gordon Knott will recall his past with Wokingham RT. I may have to press the editing button more than usual !! Ed.





Nothing to report.


AOB



Wokingham Round Table (831), Round Table Area 25, A Personal Tale

As prophesied, our new friends in Wokingham Round Table annihilate us with their banter, sharp wit and quick one liners. But once the Stripper had taken centre stage, our new friends lost interest in our humiliation and showed their appreciative noisy side, until the talcum powder appeared.

It was a tradition in Wokingham Round Table for new members to be tasked with organising one of their early meetings. And so, Jeremy and I found ourselves at the pub, organising. How quickly we slipped into the ways of Tabling.

After several pub visits, the only idea to survive was The Quiz. Questions written, we put down our pencils and in unison said, "they are going to annihilate us". To save the evening, we did what every Tabler has done before us. We booked a Stripper as the support act to The Quiz. The talcum powder was her idea.

Wokingham Town was fortunate, it had two Round Table Clubs, Wokingham and West Forest. The later having been started when numbers in Wokingham RT got too big, that was the official line.

Charity and the Community was a big part of the Club, as it still is for all Tables today. We could be found rattling tins on the streets of our market town, arranging lunches for the elderly (they were of similar age to me now) cutting lawns or pushing cars out of fields after Firework Night.

Christmas was a busy time for tin rattling. Saturdays in December we could be found collecting in town. During the evenings we took Santa's Sleigh around the local housing estates, knocking on doors, collecting money for our "good causes".

My first Christmas as a Tabler, I got lucky. I had the lead role, Father Christmas on the third slot of the day. I arrived at the Town Hall early for the costume handover. Robe on, belt tied, hat on, just the beard. No one thought to mention if you have the lead role and are not the first slot, bring your own beard. After four hours, two Father Christmas', the beard was wet, bad smelling and ho-ho, waiting for me.

On the social side we had family sports day, themed parties, progressive suppers, treasure hunts. There were Area events, Rowlock Rally, Smoker and of course National Sporting Weekend. We had BBQs in the field at Cantley and the return to Cantley to ensure the hot embers discarded under the hedge had not caught fire. There was Club Night in the Chairman's garden, clay-pigeon shooting. But it was okay, health and safety was not an issue in those days.

Sports Day, a fun event for all the family. Fun races for the children, welly throwing for all, 100 yard dash and Beverley's wardrobe malfunction. Funny how certain images stay with you. Beverley did not win but received the loudest appreciative applause.

Rowlock Rally, a relay row from Abingdon to Henley. Some Clubs thought it was a race. You could easily spot them, they would be the ones carrying their heavy boats over the lock when the lock gates were against them. Wokingham RT used the closed lock for a well-deserved rest. That is not to say we did not give it our all. We did, we were punctual at the hand over points and rowed hard, by our standard.

Area Smoker, a highlight in the calendar year, held at Slough Community Centre. The venue was perfect but

more importantly, they allowed us back every year. The format of the evening involved half-a-dozen Clubs in Area 25 performing a spectacular entertaining short Show. The Shows were judged and the winner had the honour of organising next year's Smoker. And yes, you've spotted the problem. No Club wanted to organise next year's Smoker so Shows were written to ensure second place or lower.

But Tablers knew how to incentivise and dozens of white bread rolls were provided. These were not for eating and if they were stale, all the better. They were for dunking in beer and in experienced hands, became deadly missiles. If the Tablers on stage displeased, the dunked bread rolls were dispatched at speed in their direction. To ensure no downtime between Shows, exotic dancers wearing very little, eventually, were booked. Several, indeed, as they would be on stage many times during the evening!



One-year, Smoker achieved notoriety in the Sunday Papers with the headline "Round Tablers Watch Strippers As Building Burns".

Part of the headline is true and it is also true the Centre's fire alarms did go off. Two big red fire engines did arrive in a blaze of sirens and flashing blue lights and yes, strippers were on stage being noisily appreciated as firemen wearing masks and breathing apparatus burst into the hall.

With the motto "Adopt, Adapt, Improve" or it may have been "the show must go on", the show continued and the strippers "entertained". The only outward sign they showed that they were aware the fireman had arrived, their tassels started spinning faster and in different directions.

It all started when the alarm confused the smoke it detected as fire smoke. But it was grey bellowing plumes of motor bike exhaust. A Club was going all out to win Smoker and the motor bike on stage was going to clinch the win. When I say "on stage" that is not quite correct. Jumping the bike off the four-foot-high stage onto the central aisle at full throttle was going to clinch the win. It was okay, health and safety was not an issue in those fun days. To jump the bike, fast acceleration was required, to get fast acceleration a lot of engine reviving was required. This in turn created bellowing plumes of exhaust which was required to trigger the fire alarm. How were we to know, we had no risk assessment.

We explained this to the firemen. They explained to us, having been called out they must check the building and ensure it is safe. Concerned they were going to evacuate us, we invited the firemen to join us. So, they sent a couple of rookie firemen to check the building and made themselves comfortable at the back of the hall wondering, how two tassels can spin that fast in different directions at the same time.

With the charity, community work and the social side of Club, fellowship in Wokingham's Round Table flourished. Today, Wokingham has a successful active 41 Club, meeting the second Tuesday of every month at Sand Martins Golf Club. Oh, except those months with a 2020 in it.

Thank you Gordon for that 'insight' (I use that word loosely) into your Tabling with Wokingham. I also took part in the Rowlock Rally in the late 70's. Readers will recall that another of these articles was written (Cartier 9) by Paul Thackray who was also a Wokingham RT member, obviously before Gordon joined because Paul made no mention of such 'lively' evenings!! He talked about "music hall shows which could get a bit smutty". Wokingham went downhill after Paul left!!


2020 Wickens Wander - London
